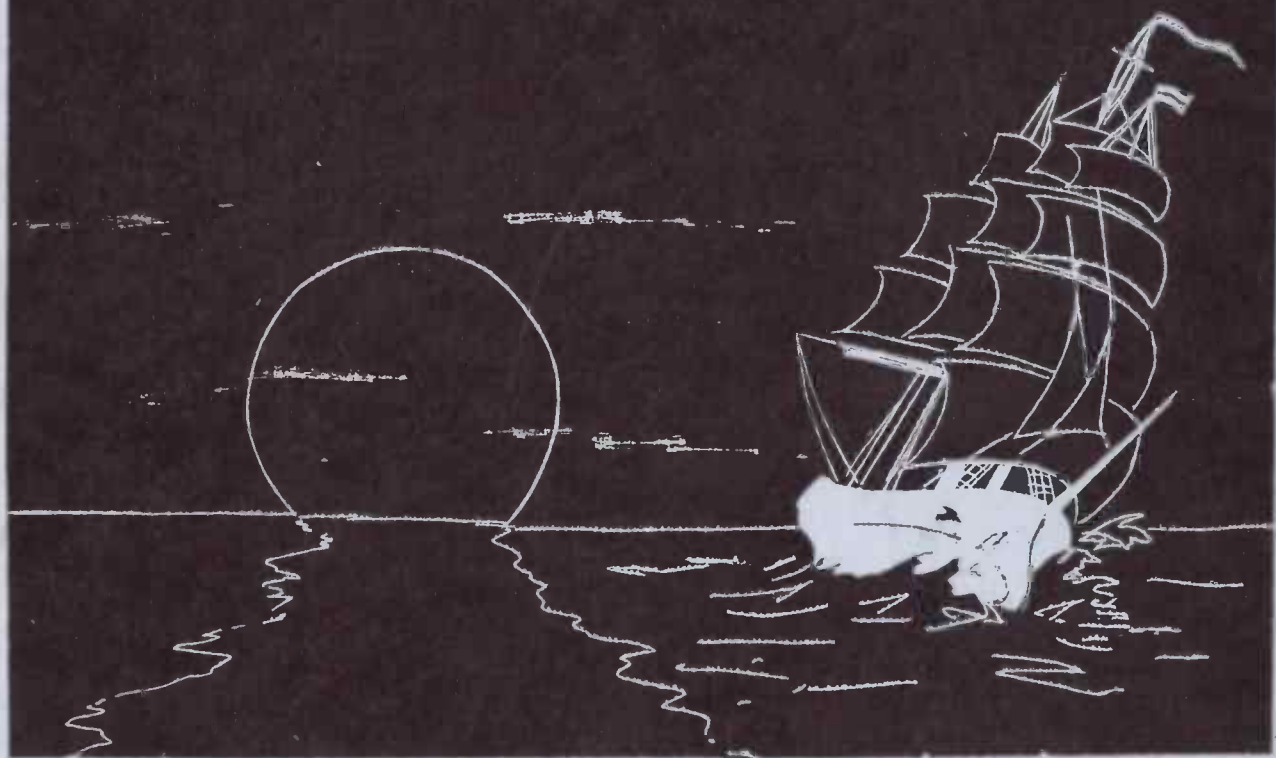

# VOYAGER 78

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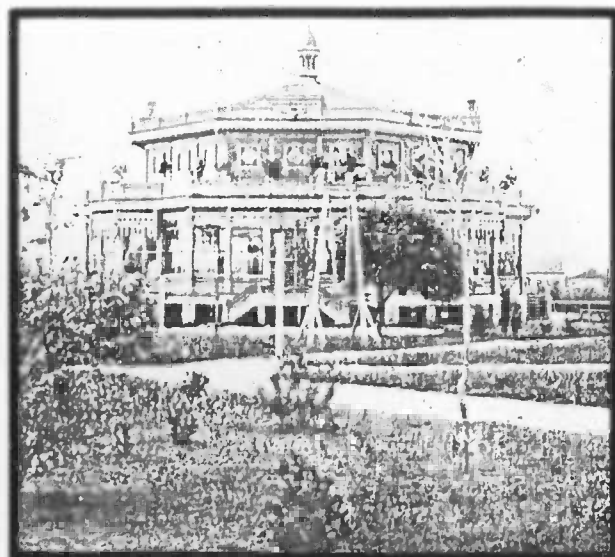
Galveston is located on the northeastern portion of Galveston island, latitude 29:18:14, longitude 94:47:26. The island is a narrow strip of land, about 30 miles long and averaging in width about one and one-half miles, paralleling the southeastern coast line of Texas. Galveston Bay is on the northern border and the Gulf of Mexico lies to the south and southeast. The city and the island are connected with the mainland by a causeway of concrete and steel, 2.2 miles long, which affords access by rail and highway. The island is in the same latitude as lower California, Northern Mexico and Florida and, generally, the winter seasons are passed without freezing temperatures. The prevailing Gulf breezes temper the heat in the summer seasons to such an extent that the city enjoys the distinction of being the most popular resort in the Middle West, throughout the heated term.



Galveston is a meeting place of the old with the new, as can be seen in the architecture of the city. The buildings of the Strand are reminders of the glory of Galveston in the 1920's, while the modern ANACO building rises above the old and shows the city's determination to remain a symbol of progress in Texas



In 1867 plans for Garten Verein were begun when several prominent German lawyers, bankers and merchants decided to secure a permanent location for their popular "Manifests". The large paneled dance pavilion was built in late 1879. It was one of the finest and most conveniently arranged dance pavilions in the entire country. Octagon shaped, it has no columns on the dancing floor and its unique system of wood bracing has enabled it to withstand high winds and storms since it was built. In 1923 Garten Verein stockholders voted to sell the property to Stanley E. Kempner who in turn donated the entire grounds to the city of Galveston for use as a park and recreational area. Moody College students used the dance pavilion this year for the site of their Spring Dance.



Dicken's Evening on the Strand is an annual event near Christmas in which three blocks of the Strand are transformed magically into an authentic re-creation of the street life and shops on the English Strand at the height of Charles Dicken's writings, 1840-1870. Carolers roam down the length of the street singing Christmas carols, while notable Dicken's characters, such as Scrooge and the Artful Dodger, mingle with the crowds. Vendors hawking their wares and old-fashioned stores make this event a treat for Moody College students, especially as a break from final's studying. The school's rugby team is noted for singing bawdy songs in the Den, a Strand pub, during this event.



Galveston has been the site of several disasters, and has caught the nation's eye more than once this year. Most notable was the grain elevator explosion during the Christmas break. Our campus police were on hand to help divert traffic from the scene. The school lost a dear friend and co-worker in this disaster — Mr. Larry Biggs was killed instantly. His wife, Robbie, was mail clerk for the school at this time, and we would like to express our deepest sympathy to her on the loss of her husband, our friend.



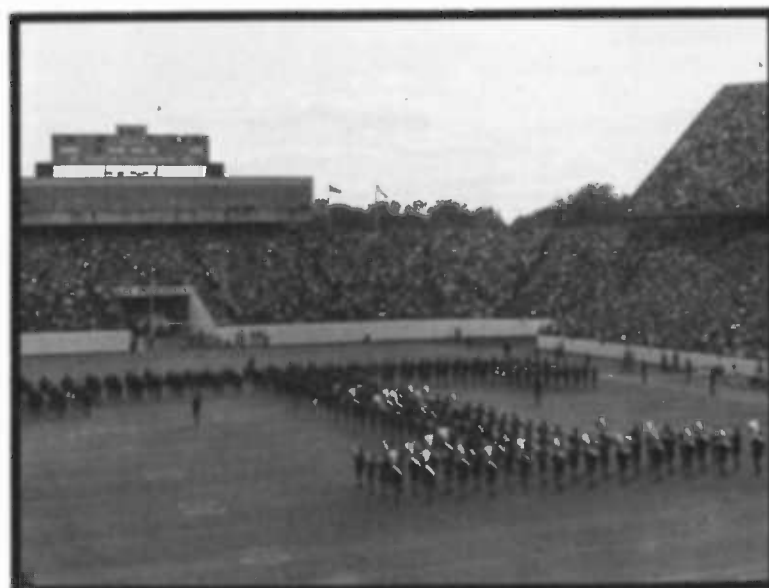
The school was ready for evacuation orders in Fall of '77 as one hurricane came a bit too close for comfort. The surfers, however, couldn't stop raving about the size of the waves . . . The big blue crane, that was a landmark to many sailors, toppled down and wrecked a row of cars in the company parking lot of a Galveston firm . . . A rare sperm whale was left high and dry on the Galveston beach, and Sea-Arama vets, as well as two Moody College students, fought desperately to save its life. The whale died, but the effort was noteworthy . . . An arsonist was burning down historical buildings in Galveston, particularly on the Strand. Fire gutted the Brass Rail as campus police again aided the Galveston squad in traffic control around the area.



Over the years Mrs. Mary Moody Northern of Galveston has been a staunch supporter of Texas A&M's Moody College, and particularly its Texas Maritime Academy. Her assistance has gone into buildings, scholarships and library development. As a way of saying "thank you," the students and staff of Moody College named our new student center in her honor following her annual sendoff breakfast for Senior cadets of the Texas Maritime Academy.

Effective as of September 1 this last year, The Moody College of Marine Sciences and Maritime Resources had its name shortened to simply: Moody College. The current department of Marine Sciences was redesignated "School of Marine Technology" while the other departments, Coastal Zone and Texas Maritime Academy, remained relatively unchanged.

Most important to the students of Moody College is the Texas A&M stamp on the school. The Spirit of Aggieland is a source of pride to the students and we try to participate in as many of A&M's traditions as possible, as shown by our Bonfire, Aggie Muster, Corps March-Ins, and yell practices for the football season.



The cafeteria and classroom are just part of the everyday routine for dormitory students and cadets. Every floor in the dorm had its share of hamsters, parakeets, and an occasional snake or dog as the pet craze hit the school. Well, the dogs had to go, as well as any other large pet that was a threat to the student's health. If the student doesn't have any pets to play with, he is most likely to be found in the game room playing either pool, foosball, or ping-pong.





There are a number of organizations on campus open for student participation. The Sail Club, for example, has members who repair sailboats during their spare time, working toward the time they will be able to sail down the channel on a hot summer day. Other students find a "release" from studies through skateboarding or throwing a frisbee around. These two activities are refined into a fine art on campus with students showing superb form in a backward catch of the frisbee or a handstand on a skateboard. The beach and surfing provide the most common recreation for the students, however, no matter what their classification or major is.



Student workers are becoming a common sight on campus as more and more students try to help out with the college expenses. Jobs range from such "cushy" jobs as lifeguard, phone monitor for the campus police, and library assistant, to the "manual labor" jobs exemplified by working for the cafeteria, maintenance, or physical plant. Five resident advisors, who sometimes say the job is easy and sometimes claim they're going crazy from all the work, are also employed by the school. Anyone need a job?







Sea-Arama Marineworld provides one of the more exotic settings for student workers. Several students are employed as: maintenance workers, whose job it is to keep the tanks scraped and clean; divers, who put on a show in the large observation aquarium; water-skiers, who put on a spectacular water-ski show; and part-time curators, who oversee all of the animals in the park. Sea-Arama provides the perfect opportunity for students in the Marine Science or Marine Biology fields to gain some practical experience working with marine animals.



Galveston provides the students with recreational facilities as well as study sites for school work. Students can enjoy trips on the Bolivar Ferry, feeding the gulls, or visit the local disco at the Islander. There are also a number of bars for students who just want to relax and talk over a cool beer. Galveston also has the natural resources for those who have to seine for various organisms, collect algae from the jetty, or collect oysters for a delicious meal.

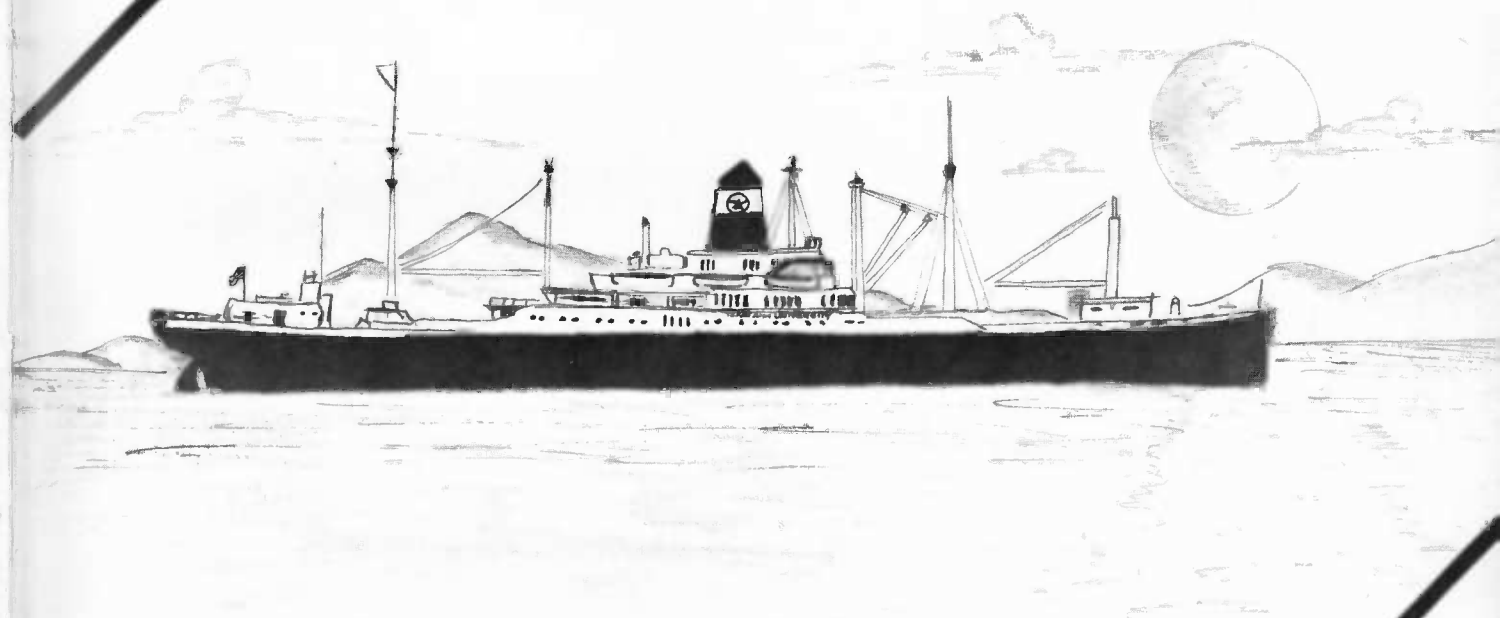




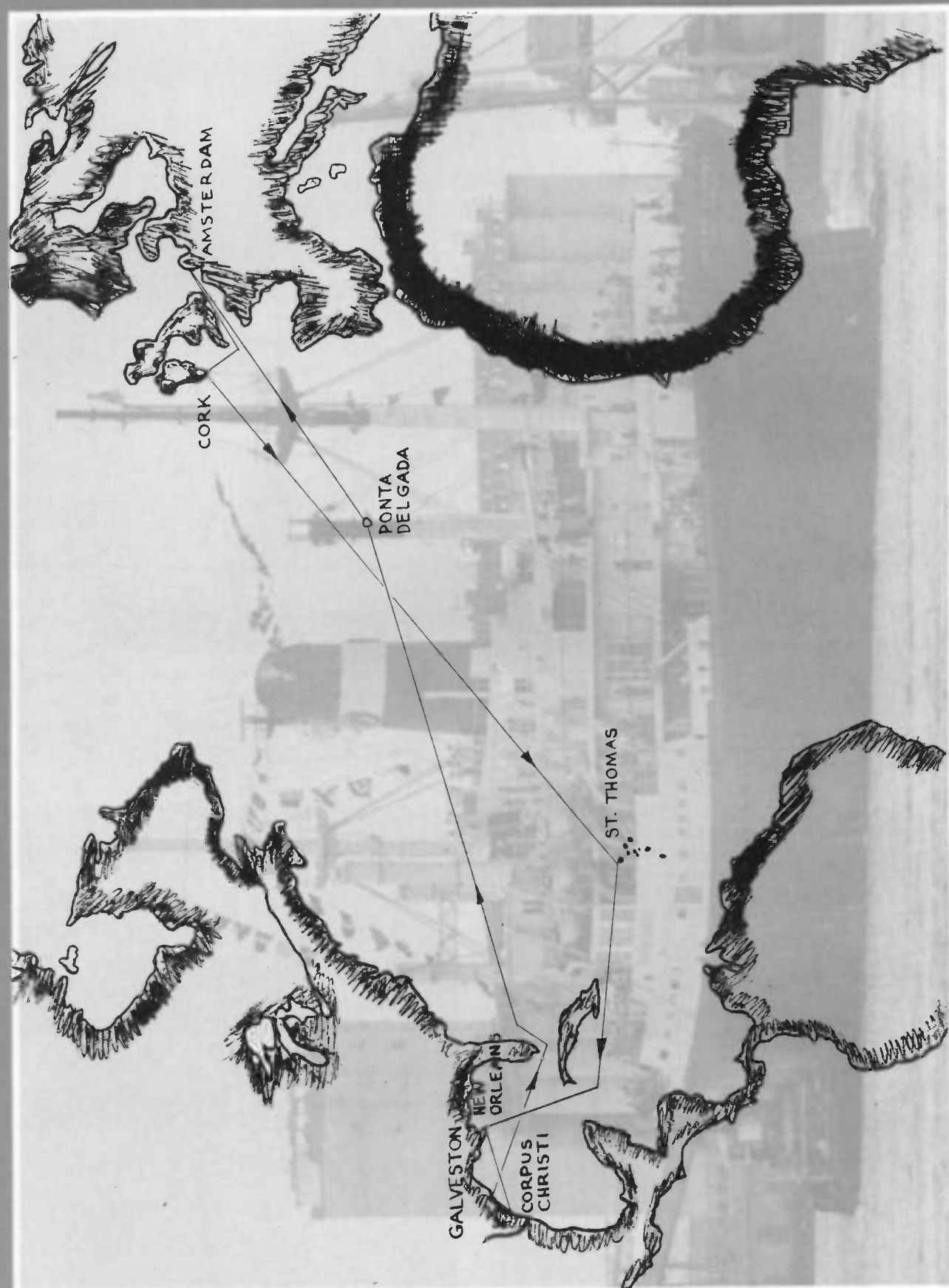

Other students volunteer or are employed by marine fisheries in the area. Cadets most often find work as pilots or "deckies" on a ship in port. Each, in his own way, is contributing to Galveston, and in a deeper sense, to his own future.

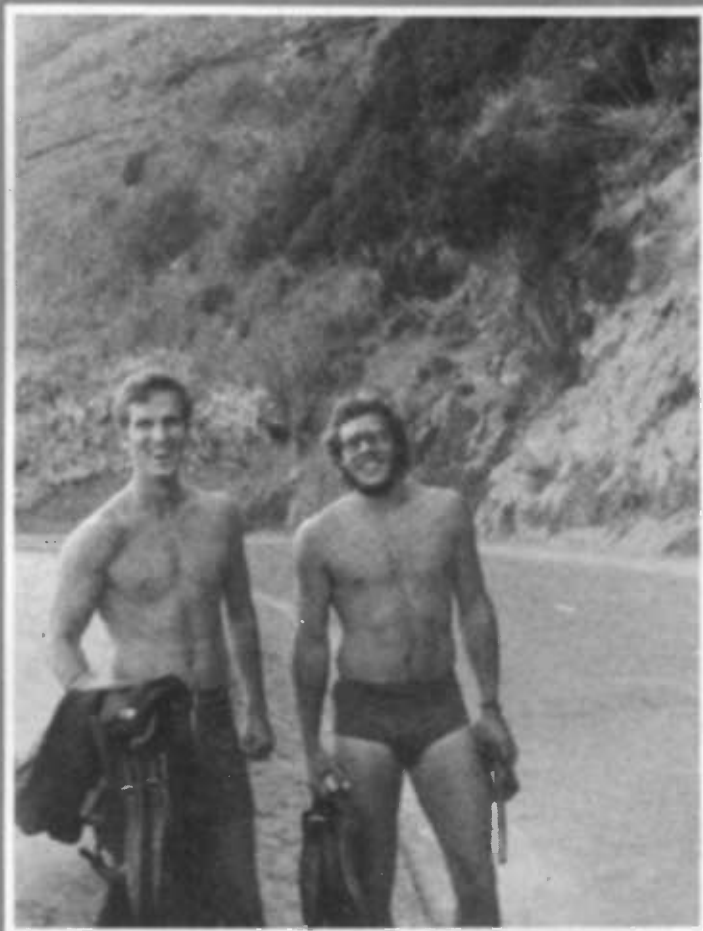

## CONVOCATION

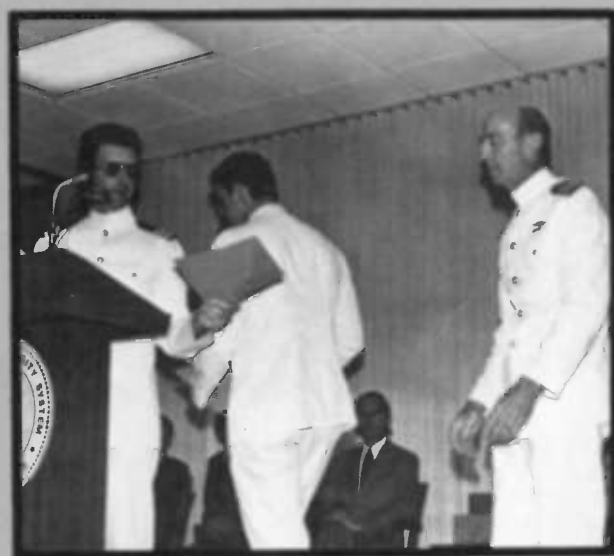

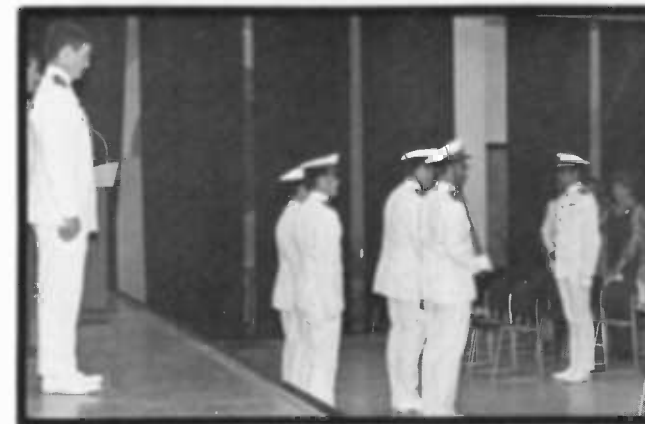


## IN MEMORIAM

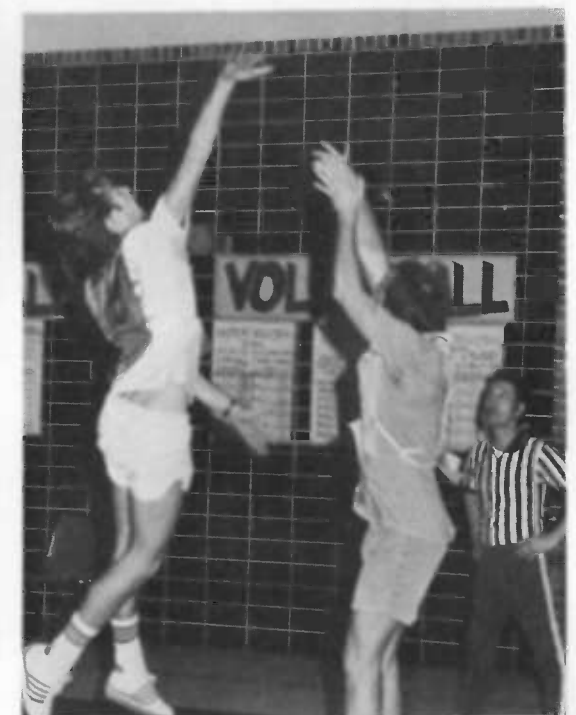

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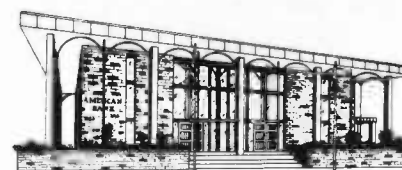
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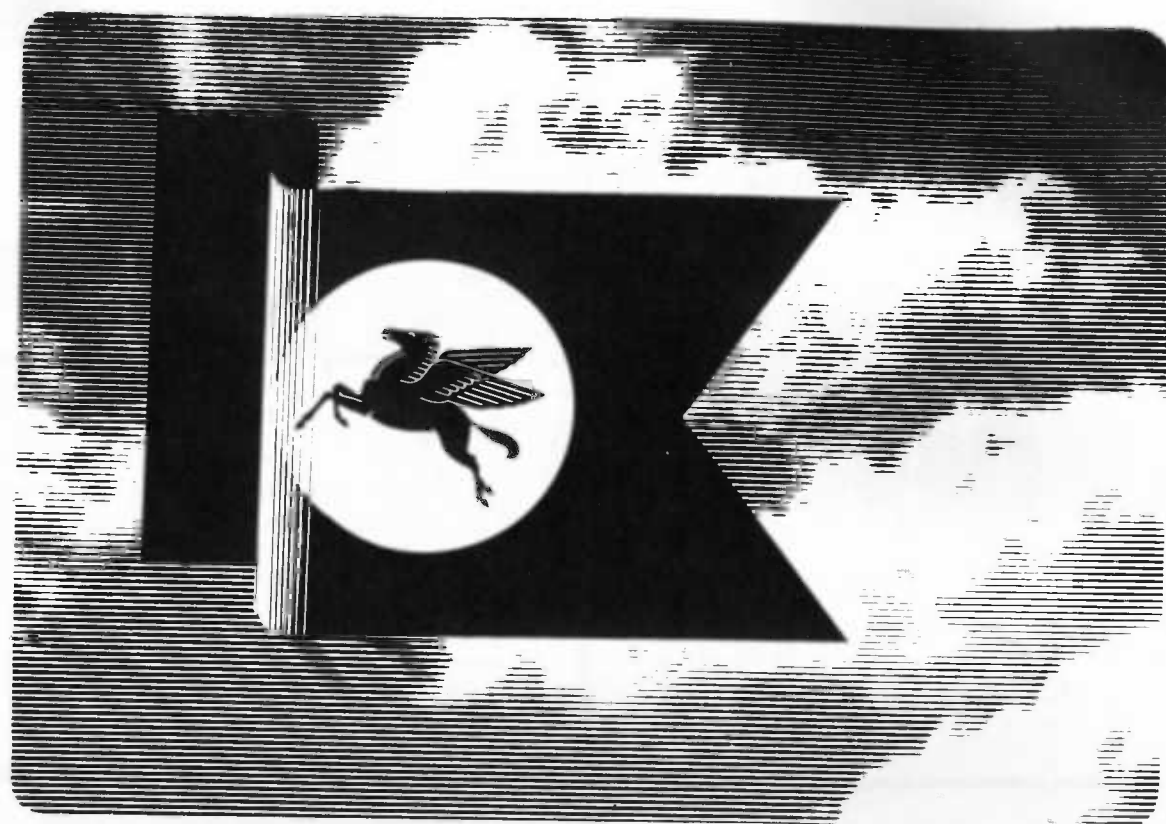
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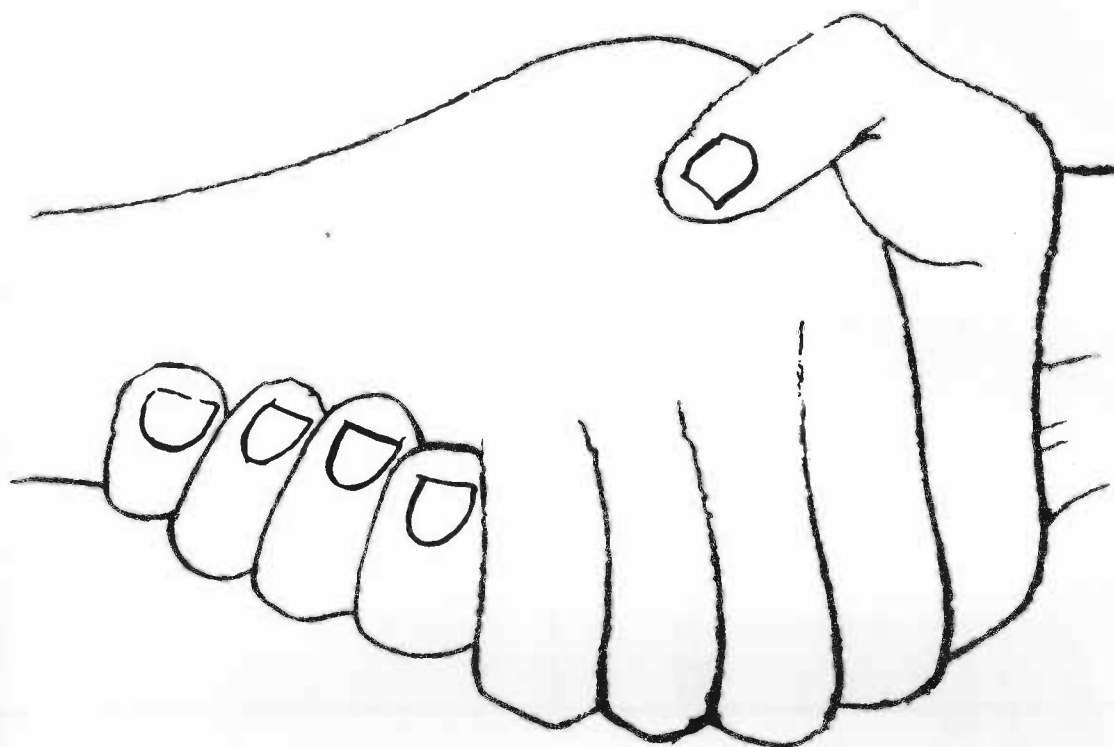
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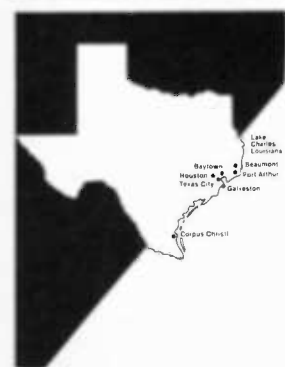
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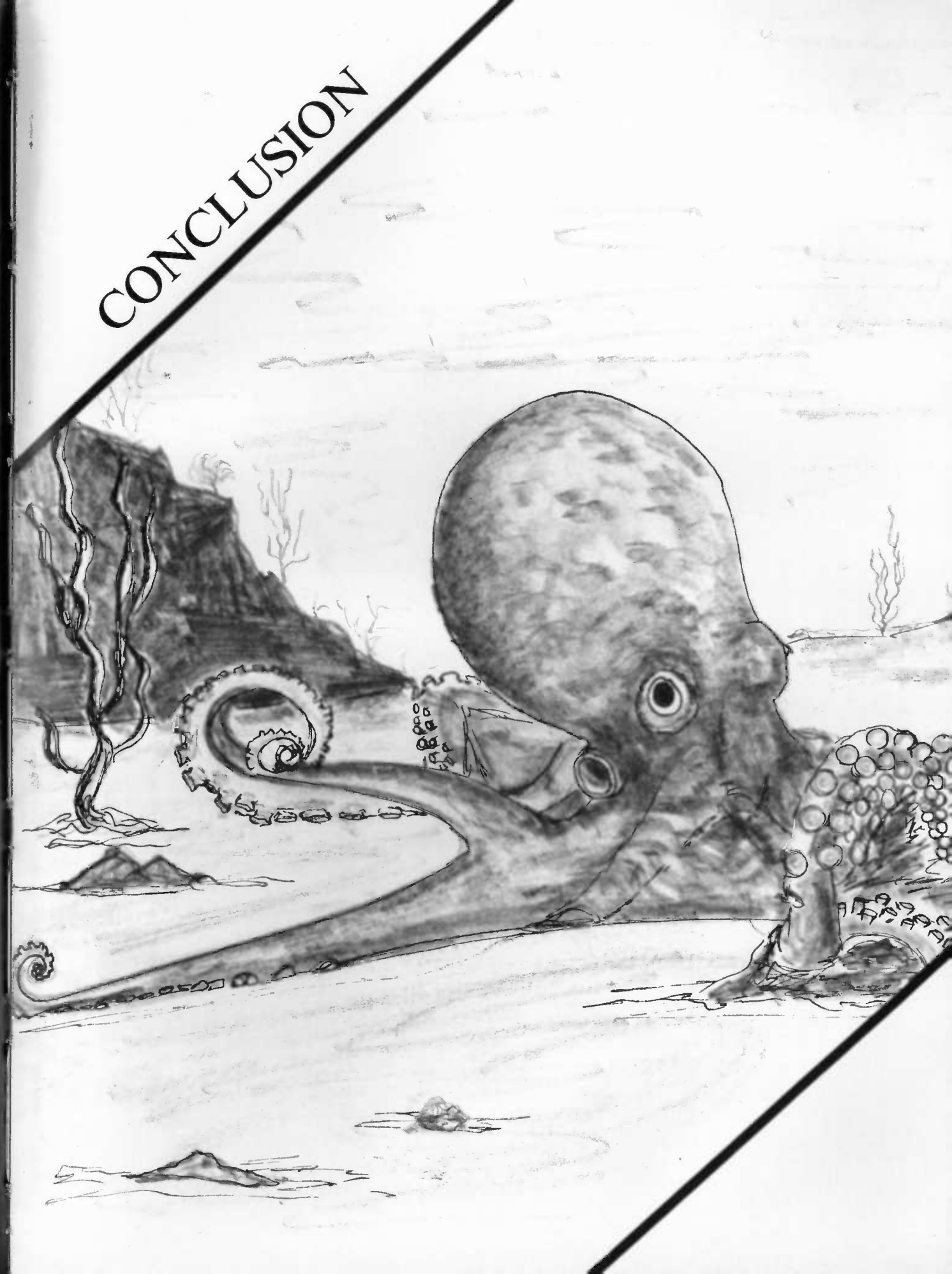
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CONCLUSION

## DEDICATION


