Dear Fellow Students,

Our illustrious school, Texas A&M University at Galveston, has a rich and wonderful history. The academic school year, 1987-88, marks the 25th anniversary of the Texas Maritime Academy. It was in 1962 that twenty-seven freshmen enrolled into the Texas Maritime Academy program at College Station. However, one can go further into the past to find the roots of this school. According to one source, in the early 50's, there was a Galveston Marine Lab established in someone's garage. In 1954 the Department of Oceanography and Meteorology of Texas A&M established the Galveston Marine Laboratory in Galveston, Texas. It wasn't until 1958 that Fort Crockett near the Seawall, was used. Originally, the lab had a staff of four people. Mr. Albert Collier was the director of the lab, and Mr. Wayne Cotter was the research assistant. The remaining staff members consisted of a part-time secretary and a maintenance man. The first fundings were mainly for Bioassay work (refinery toxic tests on fish).

In the early 60's the research lab started teaching summer seminars to high school science teachers. Throughout the 60's summer marine science courses continued to be taught. Out of such courses came such illustrious people as Dr. Donald Harper and Dr. William Wardle. Also, at this time, Fort Crockett was going through some major remodeling. It was being prepared for the Maritime Academy. Half the building was turned over to this new branch. A cafeteria, dorm section, and bookstore were all prepared for the undergraduate students.

Since the early years of the academy, much has been changed. In the 60's only part of the degree plan was obtained in Galveston. A student enrolled in the Texas Maritime Academy program was expected to spend his freshman and sophomore years in College Station and complete the rest of his degree in Galveston. It was not until 1965 that the Clipper was obtained. For the first few years of the academy, cadets joined those from the Maine Maritime on their summer cruises. Then in 1965, when we attempted to take the T.S. Clipper on her maiden training cruise, she broke down in the channel.

1971 was a year of great changes. Moody College of Marine Sciences and Maritime Resources was created by combining the Marine Lab with the academy and adding a department of Marine Sciences. At this time the undergraduate students were moved over to "beautiful" Pelican Island (Pelicatraz?). Marine Academy freshmen through seniors were included in this move. The Clipper was moved over from Pier 19 to its present berth and used as a dormatory during the academic year.

Recently, I met a graduate from the class of '75. She was in the second graduating class from the newly combined school. Evidently, at this time some students were still living in the Fort Crockett complex. She said there were many times she would be attending class at Fort Crockett and have the smell of cooking waft through the room. Dr. Sammy Ray, who has been here since 1960, told of a time when he was working in his office late one night and had to ask the students to quit dropping barbells on the floor above his office.

Looking around, we can see how much we have grown. We now have three dorms and four classroom buildings, plus numerous extentions over the original one room garage. Although reality doesn't always match the artist's conceptions of the future, we must remember we still exist. Although our survival has appeared grim at times, with the support of a continually growing student body and a new president, we have a bright future.






#### POLYWOGS NO MORE!




