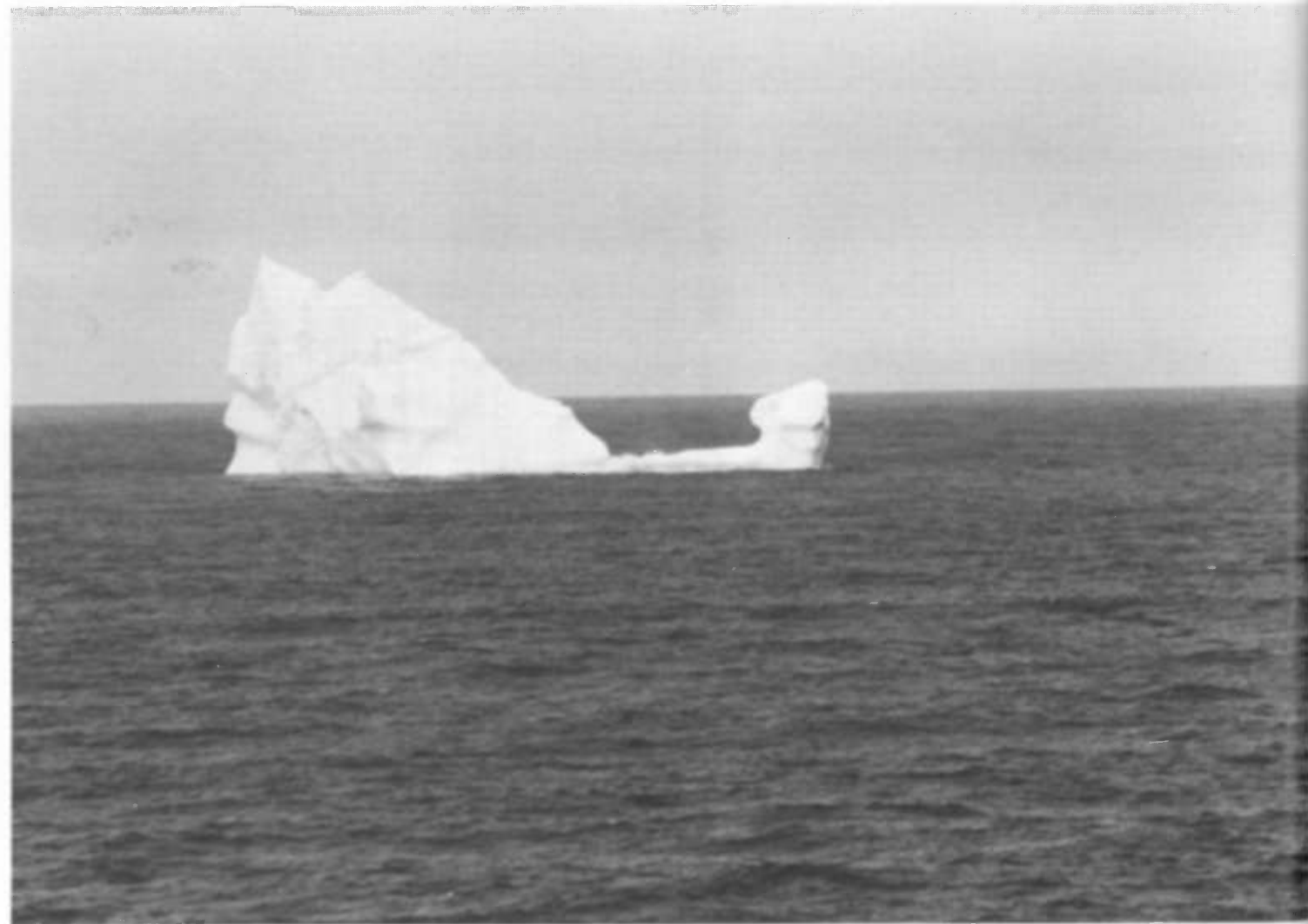

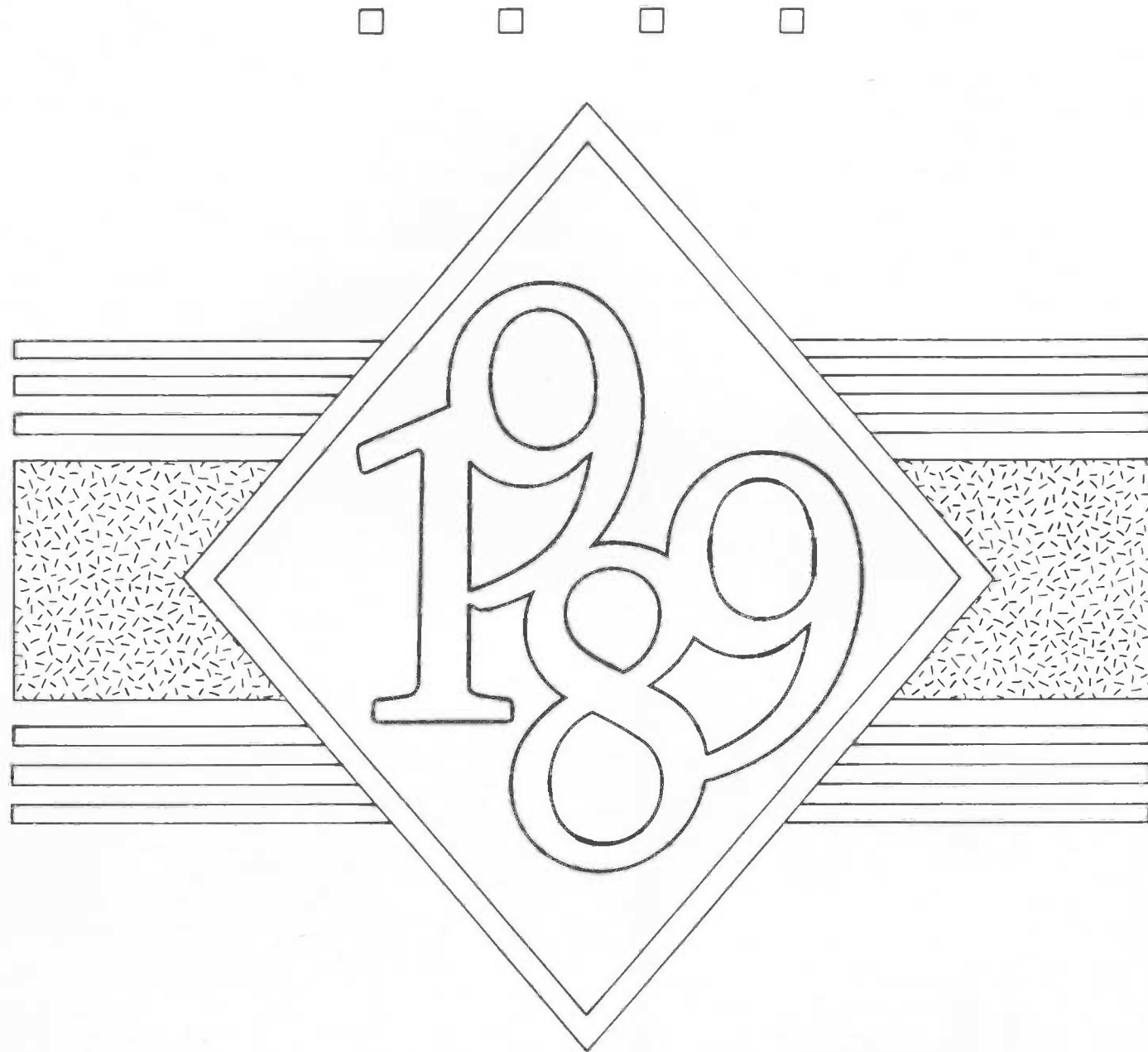


## CRUISE CANDIDS

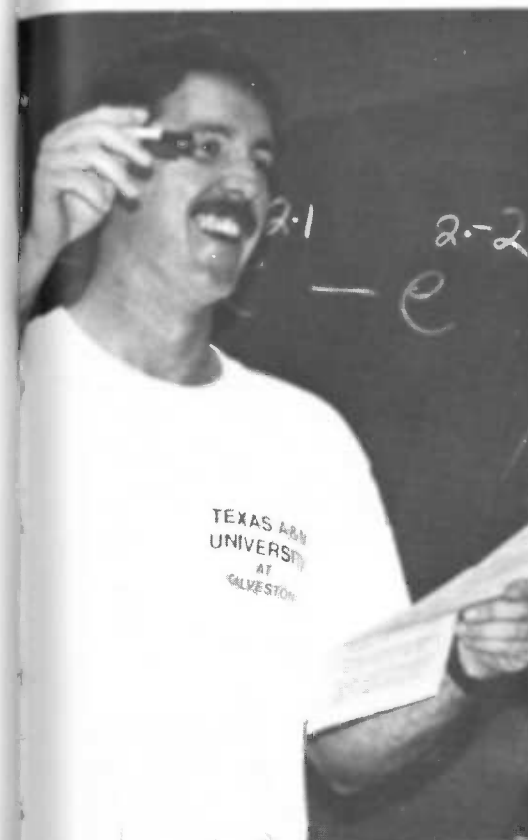

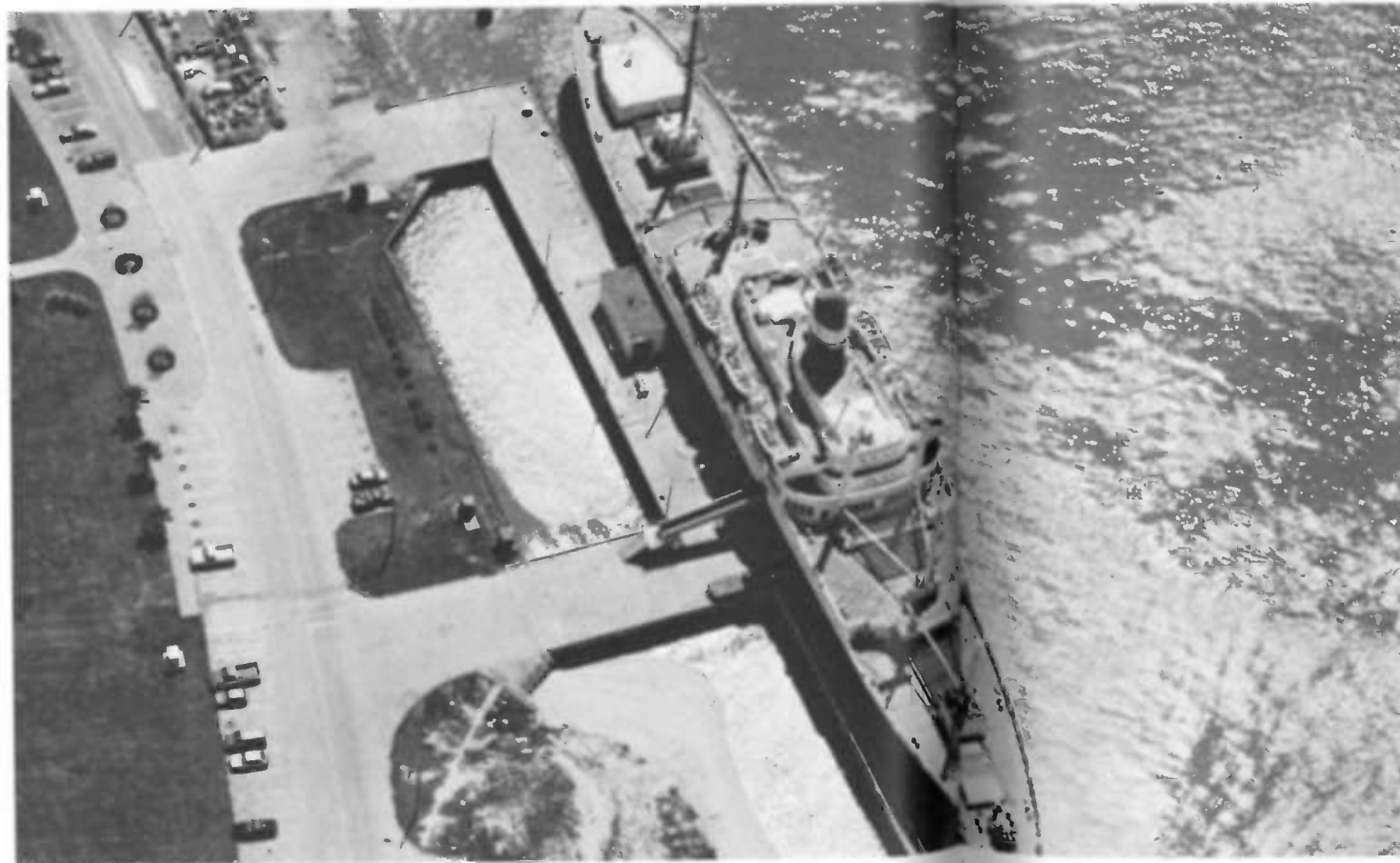

Trophies were awarded for first and second places of each division and teams. Each participant learned quickly the rules of wave possession, interference and sunburn.

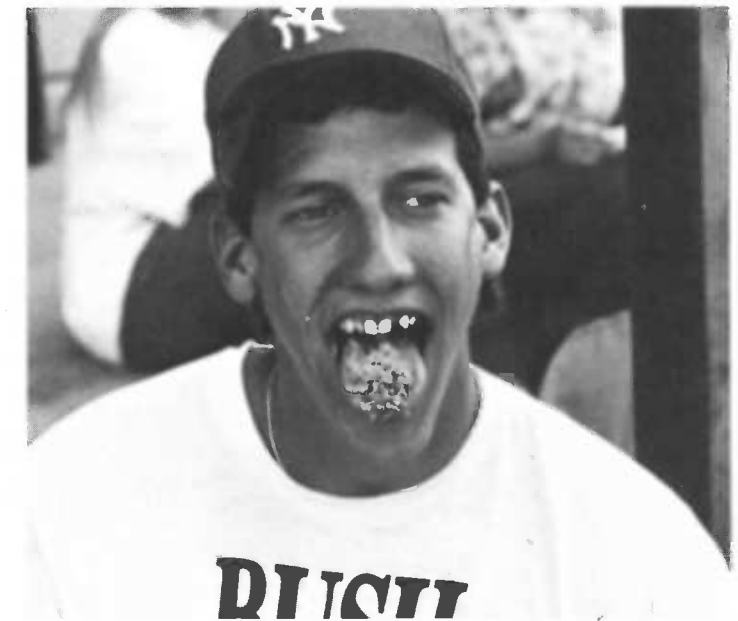

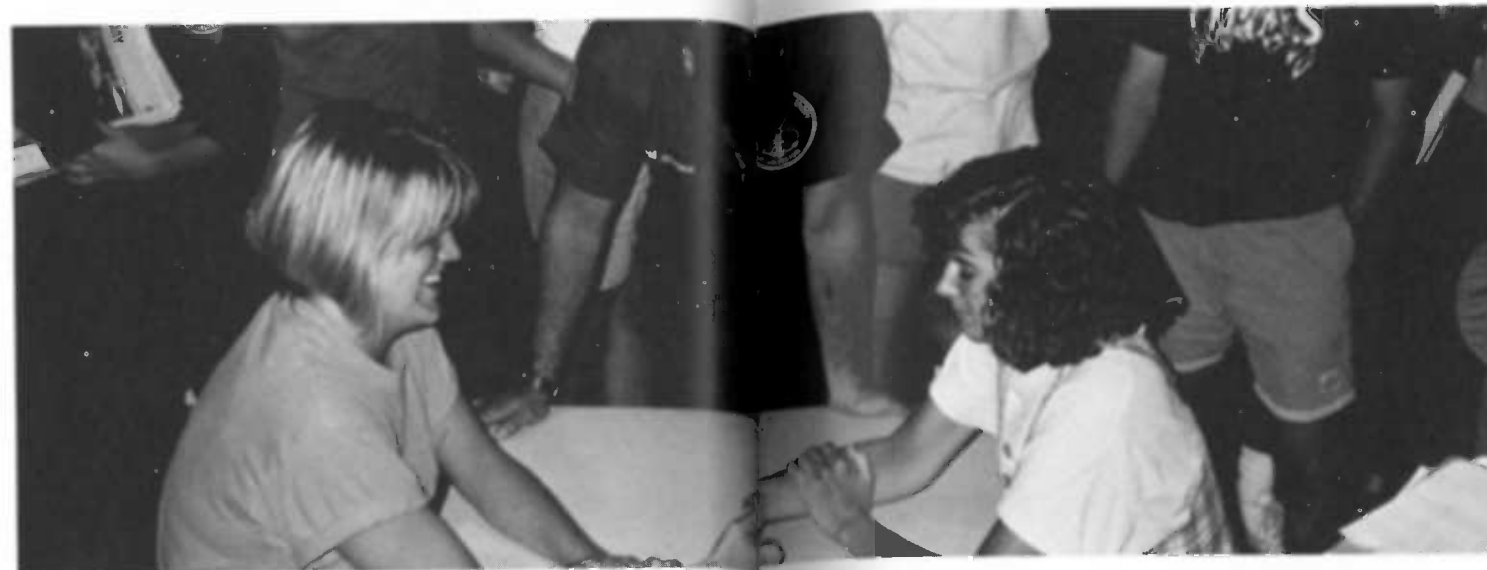

# SPRINGFEST 1989

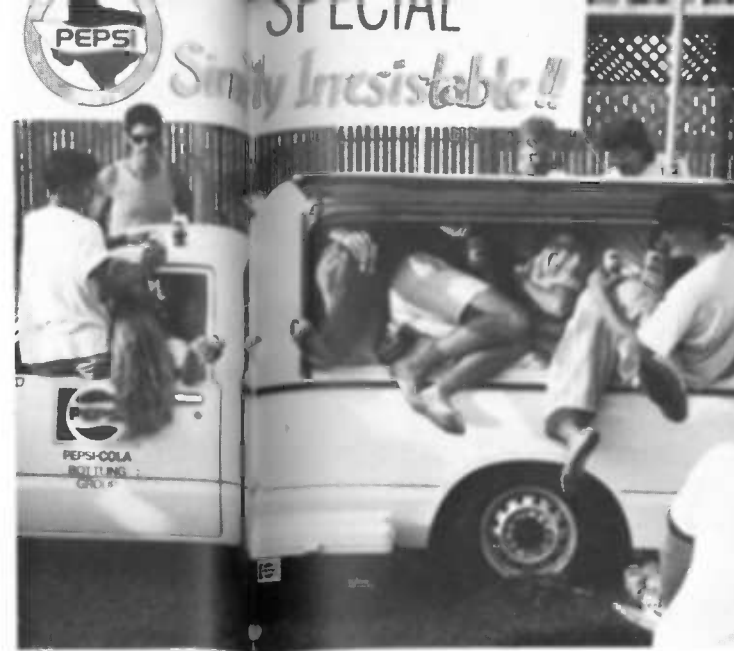

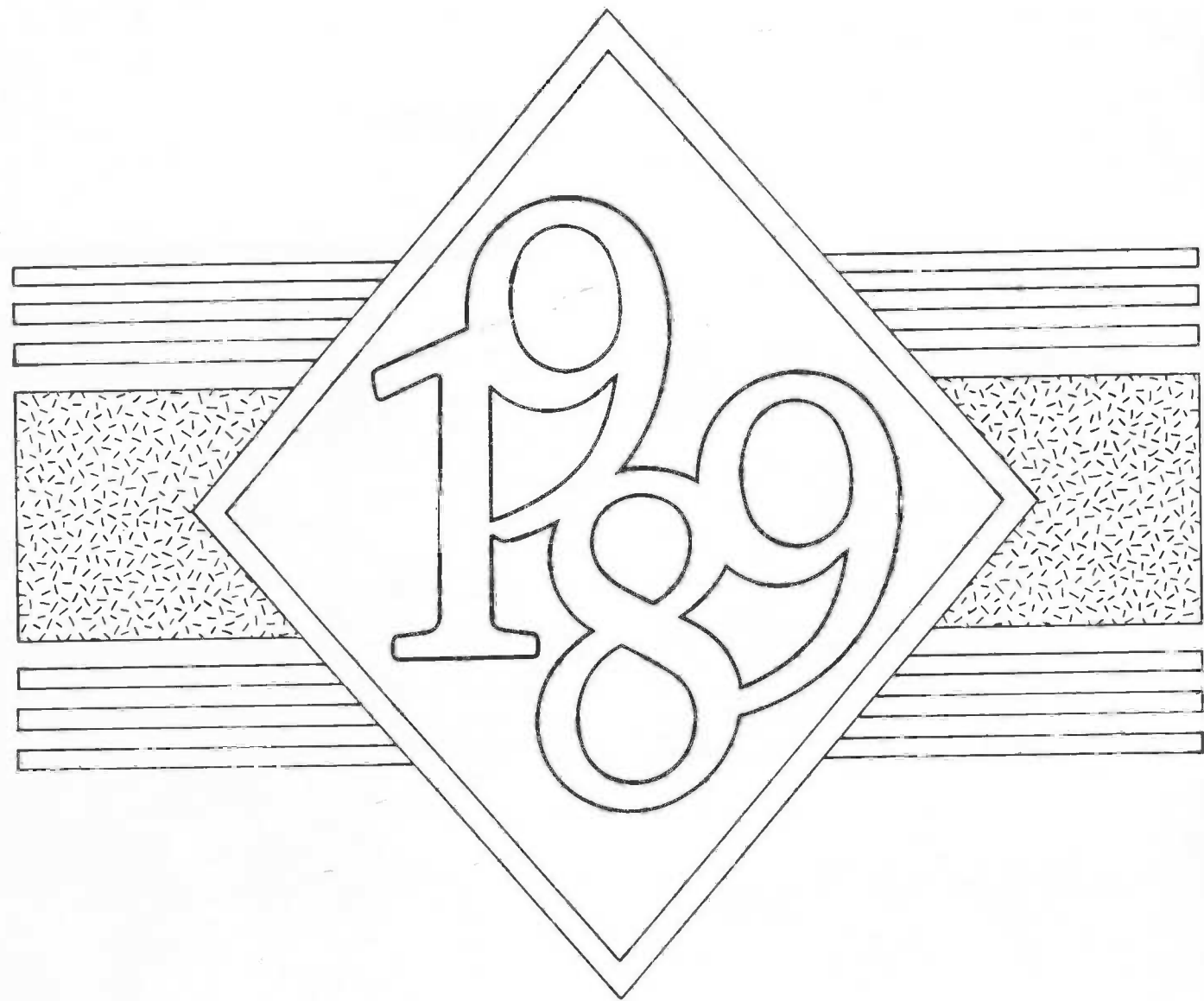

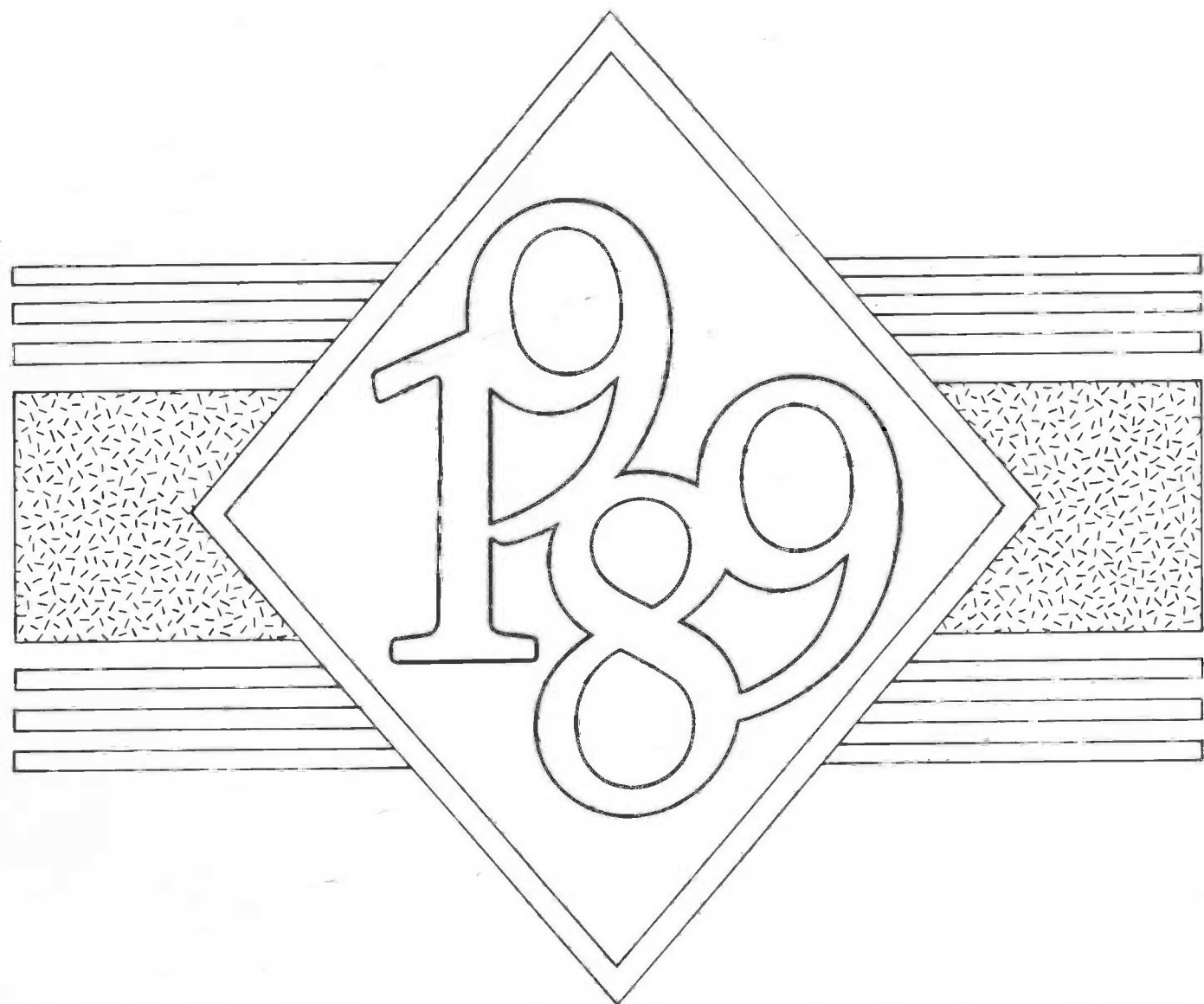
