party.


























CASINO NIGHT

The Moody College Emergency Care Team was formed this semester by a group of students and faculty, who were interested in emergency medical training and services for the campus. The goals of the organization are to set up an emergency medical service for the students, work with area Red Cross in disaster assistance and also other community needs. The Team is open to all students, faculty and staff of Moody College. Our present enrollment ranges from first aid to emergency care attendant, water safety instructor, emergency medical technician. This year was our first year as an organization, but we managed to work while we set up our Team. Some of our activities were Bonfire first aid, a Walkathon in Texas City, The Galveston Shrimp Festival Run, and many minor student emergencies. Next year the team will be fully active in most student activities.






