and Pierre Lafitte, pirates/privateers living in Louisiana and Galveston, Texas. The collection consists of subject files containing letters, emails, articles, news clippings and other reports and accounts. A number of files pertain to the issues of authenticity regarding the Jean Laffite diary.

## **BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION**

Reginald Wilson, physician, historian and amateur radio operator, was born February 14, 1920 in Liberty, Texas. He graduated with a medical degree from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in 1944. As a young doctor, he was assigned to the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota, where he met and married a young nurse Elizabeth "Betty" Olean Olson of Hatton, North Dakota. Betty graduated from the Kahler School of Nursing at the Mayo Clinic.

During World War II, Dr. Wilson was stationed as an Army physician at Ft. Sheridan, Illinois. He was in charge of the operating room in a 600 bed hospital. After the war ended, he and Betty established his private practice in Dayton, Texas. He retired forty years later. He and Betty also traveled for seven years to the Yucatan as medical missionaries to provide care to Mayan natives in a Presbyterian Church station at Xocemth, state of Yucatan, Mexico.

Dr. Wilson's interest in the history of privateers Jean and Pierre Laffite stems, in part, to a family connection. His Great-Great Aunt Annie Barber married one of the former "pirates" from Laffite's gang at Galveston. According to Dr. Wilson, Charles Tilton, a young boy from the northeast, served as a cabin boy with a whaling ship. A day after the ship left port, they were captured by one of Laffite's pirate ships. Tilton was the only member of the crew to survive. He was taken to Galveston and not allowed to leave until Jean Laffite was forced by the U.S. government to remove himself from Galveston Island. Initially, Tilton wound his way back home, but later returned to Texas and married Annie Barber.

Dr. Wilson joined The Laffite Society in 1994 and was a frequent contributor of articles to The *Laffite Society Chronicles*, including an article about Charles Tilton.

## **Scope and Contents Notes**

"Jean Laffite (ca.1776-ca.1823) and his older brother Pierre Laffite were French pirates and privateers in the Gulf of Mexico in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century." [Wikipedia] Though historical characters, the facts of their lives were surrounded by myth and legend. Born in France, they immigrated to the New World. By 1805, Jean Laffite operated a warehouse in New Orleans to disperse the goods smuggled by his brother, Pierre. They moved their operations to an island in Barataria Bay (Wikipedia). Jean Lafitte helped Andrew Jackson and the United States in the War of 1812 against the British in exchange for pardons for him and his men. In 1815-1821 they moved their operations to Galveston, Texas, (which they called Campeche) where they spied for the Spaniards and were involved in smuggling and the slave trade.

This collection consists of 5 cubic feet of research files arranged alphabetically by subject. The contents include letters, emails, photocopies from published and manuscript sources, articles, poetry, news clippings, reports and accounts. The files pertain to the lives and associates of Jean and Pierre Lafitte. Dr. Wilson was very interested in the researching the authenticity of what is now considered a forged diary of Jean Laffite. Dr. Wilson corresponded extensively with many of the significant and published Laffite historians.
