Overview

Abstract: This collection consists primarily of photocopies of articles, correspondence, research papers, manuscripts, newspaper articles, maps and excerpts from publications pertaining to the French settlement of Champ d'Asile, located in present day Liberty County, Texas.

Biographical Sketch

Following the French defeat at the Battle of Waterloo in 1815 and Napoleon's subsequent exile on St. Helena, Charles Francois Antoine Lallemand, one of his trusted generals, came to the United States. He arrived in Philadelphia in 1817 and became president of the French Emigrant Association, a group of Napoleonic exiles. The group obtained from Congress a grant of four townships in a portion of Mississippi territory, which is now part of Alabama. The land grants were sold to finance the establishment of a French military colony in Texas, on land in dispute between Spain and the United States since the Louisiana Purchase of 1803.

Lallemand's main contingent, consisting of approximately 150 men and led by Baron Antoine Rigaud, sailed from Philadelphia aboard the *Huntress* on December 17, 1817, arriving at Galveston Island on January 14, 1818. Shortly thereafter, Lallemand and his younger brother Henri, with more officers and munitions, departed for New Orleans, arriving there on February 2, 1818. They continued on to Galveston on February 19. While there the Frenchmen were the guests of Jean and Pierre Laffite, who provided the group with supplies and transportation but at the same time reported their activities to the Spanish consul in New Orleans. On March 10, the French, with the Laffites' aid, left Galveston and ascended the Trinity River in small boats. On the Trinity River near the present town of Liberty, they built strong fortifications and a village, Champ d'Asile ("field of refuge"), in defiance of Spain's decree against settlement in the area.

The intentions of Charles Lallemand and his officers remains open to question. Lallemand issued a manifesto claiming that Champ d'Asile was strictly an agricultural settlement and military only for protection. However, there is no evidence that the colonists undertook agricultural activities in a serious manner; they primarily spent their time building a fortress and manufacturing munitions. Because of their preoccupation with military exercises, the colony ran short of food. Evidence suggests that the real purpose of the expedition was to help Mexico gain its independence from Spain, place Joseph Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon, on the throne of an independent Mexico and free Napoleon from his exile on St. Helena.

Alarmed by reports of French activity, the Spanish prepared to send a military expedition, under the command of Don Juan de Castañeda, against the settlement. On learning of the Spanish advance and of objections by the United States government of the French presence, Lallemand ordered that the fort be abandoned, and the Frenchmen moved to Galveston Island. While the exiles waited for Lallemand to return from New Orleans with food, a hurricane struck the island. The storm killed many of the men and destroyed their supplies. The remaining refugees scattered; some of them remained with Laffite, but most made their way on foot to New Orleans. Charles Lallemand lived in the United States until the July Revolution of 1830, when he returned to France. He served as military governor of Corsica from 1837 to 1838 and died in Paris in 1839.

Scope and Contents of the Records

This collection consists primarily of 0.75 cubic feet of photocopies of articles, correspondence, research papers, manuscripts, newspaper articles, maps and excerpts from publications pertaining to the French settlement of Champ d'Asile, located in present day Liberty County, Texas.

To prepare this preliminary inventory, the described materials were cursorily reviewed to delineate series, to confirm the accuracy of contents lists, to provide an estimate of dates covered and to determine record types.
